One Day Officiant Licenses

As of March 28, 2023, all Town Clerks in the State of New York now issue **one-day marriage officiant license**. The fee for obtaining a one-day marriage officiant license in New York is \$25. This license allows lay individuals to perform a single wedding ceremony on a specific day without the need to become an ordained minister or government official. It's a convenient option for couples and officiants in the state. Here are the key details about the one-day officiant license:

- 1. **Eligibility:** Applicants must be at least 18 years old and provide identification. You don't need to be a New York resident to apply.
- 2. **Issuance:** The license will be issued by the **Town Clerk Office** in the city or town where the couple will be married.
- 3. **Effective Date:** The one-day officiant license is scheduled to become available at the end of March 2023, when the law goes into effect.
- 4. **Legislation:** The legislation for one-day officiant status was sponsored by State Assemblymember Sandra Galef, State Senator Alessandra Biaggi, and others. The twin bills (S739A/A06300) were signed into law by Governor Kathy Hochul.
